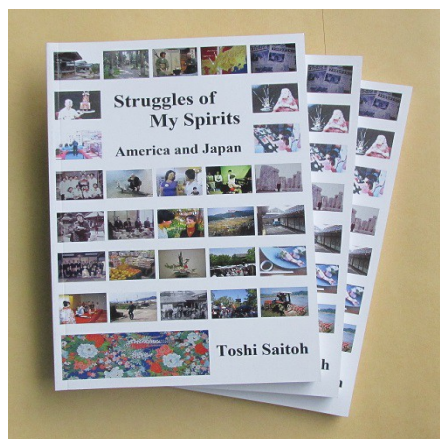

2. Japanese Language Class for Adults

Japanese language classes started from January 30th via Zoom and will end April 6th, 10 week classes. 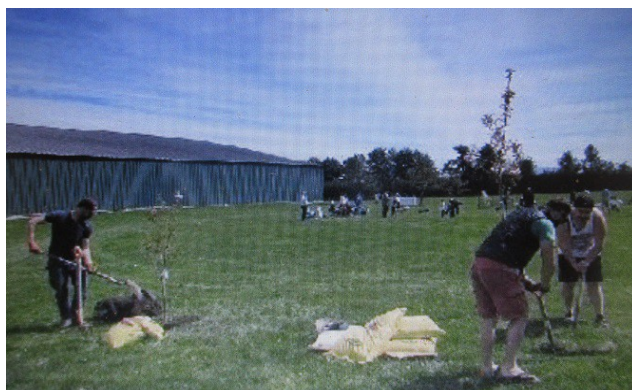
